IB Middle Years Programme

Philosophy-

The focus of the IB programme at Heritage Regional High School (HRHS) is to encourage life-long learning, international mindedness, and service to each other and our community. Heritage Regional High School is a public high school and an authorized IB World School. HRHS strives to provide a welcoming and safe environment for all groups, regardless of gender, orientation, socio-economic status, ethnicity, or any other distinguishing characteristic. We believe in tolerance, openness, and the value of education. We strive to be an inclusive community, empowering all who attend. All stakeholders - students, teachers, and administrators, must abide by the values established by the HRHS community.

School Context-

Heritage Regional High School is the 2nd largest English high school in Quebec with a population of 1600+ students. Its geographical zone covers 77 different municipalities including both rural and suburban communities.

Our diverse programs are a source of pride which helps us better meet the students' needs. In addition to the General Studies pathway, these programs include the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme, Sports Excellence, Fine Arts Focus, iCan, Modified, 15+, Evolutions, and CFER.

Registration and Application Procedures-

Parents who are interested in registering their child(ren) at Heritage Regional High School should contact us for information about eligibility and programs offered at HRHS. Registration to HRHS begins in February and is completed through the elementary feeder schools.

Eligibility for English instruction-

A certificate of eligibility is required for all children attending an English school in Quebec. The government has specific criteria that must be met according to the Charter of the French Language. We invite parents to visit the Riverside School Board website for information on eligibility requirements and how to apply for the Certificate of Eligibility.

This policy is informed by the Riverside School Board (RSB) **Policy on the Enrolment Criteria for Registration.** The purpose of this policy is to establish the enrolment criteria used to register students, including international students, in Riverside School Board schools. The criteria are further specified in the document produced annually by Riverside School Board entitled '*Planning for our Schools'* which determines each school's program(s), attendance zone, and transportation zone.

RSB Policy on the Enrolment Criteria for Registration (2020)

Acceptance to the IB MYP at Heritage is evaluated based on the application and grade 5 final report card. The online application procedure follows the school Open House event. The application process begins in mid-September to mid-October in the year prior to the start of the school year.

Heritage Regional High School hosts an Open House event where program information is delivered to prospective parents and students. The community is then invited to meet IB teachers and students from all levels to learn more about the MYP and what HRHS provides. Parents also have access to the IBMYP program information and in-house IB Newsletters on our school website. Parents are equally invited to contact the IB coordinator(s) and/or the administrator responsible, throughout the school year to obtain additional information about the MYP at Heritage.

Students who have an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) may register for any of the academic programs, provided they meet the eligibility requirements set out by the Quebec government.

Students who are accepted to the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme must also register as a student to HRHS. Students who live outside of the school zone are asked to communicate with the school by email.

Students currently in Secondary 1-4 who wish to join the IB programme are asked to contact the IB coordinator(s) to obtain a registration form and application requirements.

The IB Middle Years Programme curriculum framework-

IB provides a common educational framework and common assessment. The framework comprises eight subject groups.

- Language and Literature English and French Mother Tongue
- Language Acquisition French Second Language
- Individuals and Societies Geography, History, History and Citizenship, Contemporary World
- Sciences- General Science, Science and Technology, Biology, Environmental Science, Chemistry, Physics
- Mathematics Cultural Math, Applied Science
- **Design** integrated in Sciences and Language and Literature (English) in Secondary 1 and 2, stand alone course in Secondary 3.
- Arts-Visual and Performing Arts (Visual Arts, Dance, Drama)
- Physical and Health Education Physical Education and Health

Heritage Regional High School program overview-

There are three IB building blocks at Heritage Regional High School which focus on the development of *academics*, based on conceptual understanding, *learning skills*, and *character development*. We provide a stimulating academic environment based on traditional subjects taught in the Quebec curriculum and are able to meet the provincial requirements and IB subject objectives naturally.

Overview-

- We currently have two IB groups per level and offer enriched French Second Language as well as Français langue d'enseignement or French Mother Tongue. We also provide a third language of instruction – Spanish in Secondary 1 and 2.
- Design is a course unique to IB and is a project inquiry course that teaches students how to apply design process and problem-solving skills.
- A comprehensive Arts overview engages students in Visual and Performing Arts in each year of the programme.
- We believe that *how* students learn is just as important as *what* they learn. We help students discover who they are as learners and support the development and application of specific skills needed in the 21st century such as creative and critical thinking skills, self management, research, social, and communication skills.
- Character development is supported by the *IB Learner Profile* and the *Service as Action* component. Students take opportunities to develop, act and reflect on MYP learning outcomes for service in each year of the programme.
- The Learner Profile is a set of ten attributes which is the IB statement in action. We provide students with opportunities to practice and reflect on their experiences as learners.

- Through our yearly community service activities/engagement, subject lessons, units of study, and enrichment activities students strive to become more open minded, caring, and balanced individuals.
- In the final year of the programme students undertake an independent **Personal Project** that reflects the skills, knowledge, and personal qualities developed over time. The personal project is externally validated.
